In the meantime, spend some time outside for fall clean-up. The 2015 fall leaf dump days and times are as follows:

> Last three weekends in October (begins Oct. 17) through the first weekend of November Saturday & Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 pm.

Pondweeds in the Lake



Sago pondweed has been found in Wolf Lake; it is a nuisance weed and produces seeds in the fall. It is fast growing and stems from tubers at the base. Tubers can only get started where sunlight can get to it. Since our lake is so shallow, it is a perfect environment for this weed to flourish.

Vegetation in the lake is good but one that grows and multiplies so quickly is not good. If you have tried to lift it, you will see that it is massive and heavy. This is a safety concern in the event of a skier falling in that area or a swimmer getting caught up and entan-

gled in it as it is difficult to swim out of.

We contacted Aqua Doctors to discuss what options we have. They see it all the time in lakes and spot treat it with a combination of Endothall and Diquat. There is a 24 hour ban on swimming in the area where the water has been treated. We will be contacting them to see if they are available to speak at our annual meeting. They would be happy to answer any questions you might have regarding safety and effectiveness. We will confirm their availability in the spring newsletter.

Muskrats

Muskrats have been busy setting up home for the fall. That means that a number of you have already had the displeasure of finding chewed wiring and torn up boat seats that have facilitated their home-building. They love the long, dark passage in a boat's exhaust and have been known to stay even after someone starts the engine. They



don't seem to mind.

Muskrats burrow into the bank with an underwater entrance and create "push -ups" that can be up to three feet high. These push-ups can destroy shorelines and cause accelerated erosion. While about 95% of their diet consists of cattails and other aquatic vegetation, they also feed on frogs, small turtles and fish which might explain why we don't see many turtles or frogs like we used to.

Also, **insurance policies** typically *exclude* damage caused by "vermin," which includes muskrats. If a muskrat chews through an exhaust hose, insurance will pay for consequential damage caused by the sinking, but not for the damage to the exhaust hose itself or other damage they cause. It is a good idea to check your policy language or check with your underwriter regarding coverage.

So can anything be done to **protect our property** and boats? Glad you asked. Trappers have placed a number of floating traps in the lake to help us reduce the muskrat population. With the chilly weather keeping people out of the water, it shouldn't be a problem, but If you see these traps, please stay clear of them so the traps can do their work.


If you haven't used Facebook "Groups" before, I have some instructions on the next page on getting you connected. Thank you for your patience.

Basics of Facebook Groups



COMPUTER - When you access Facebook from your computer, you can see the groups you have joined listed in the left navigation column under **GROUPS** (illustrated to the left here). You can make it a **FAVORITE** by hovering your mouse over the group name and a gear will appear [1]. Click on the gear and select **Add to Favorites** [2]. Now it will appear under Favorites. There will be a number after the group name corresponding to the number of posts made to it that you have not yet viewed.

When you want to post to the Group (or just see what has been posted) click on the Wolf Lake Riparians name on the left, then click in the Write something... box. When your message is ready to post, click the word POST to the lower right of the text box. This information will only go to members of the group.

MOBILE DEVICES - When you access Facebook using your phone or other mobile device that uses an app, the only difference is that the navigation bar is across the top of the app. Click on the "hamburger" or menu which looks like three lines stacked on top of the other ______. There you will see the navigation bar where the Wolf Lake Riparians group will appear.

If you are a due-paying member and want to connect on Facebook, you can search for **Wolf Lake Riparians** on Facebook. Select the one that says "Closed Group" (I messed up on the other one). In the alternative, you can email me at wlrmembers@gmail.com with the name and email address you are registered with on Facebook and I'll send you an invitation.
